We would participate in these discussions with e understanding that our willingness to examine ese issues does not presuppose that UC will become volved in comprehensive delivery of care to inmates or off site at UC health facilities, or that any of the nel's recommendations for a UC-run pilot project, UC's provision or oversight of prison health rvices are feasible, given the University's primary aching and research mission and our limited sources.
