

Faye Crosby, Ph.D. L.L.D. (Hon.) is a scholar, writer, consultant, and social activist.

A recognized authority on issues of social justice, Crosby is concerned with diversity in the workplace. Crosby has authored, co-authored, edited, or co-edited 14 volumes and produced about 200 articles and chapters. Yale University Press is the publisher of Crosby's latest book *Affirmative Action is Dead; Long Live Affirmative Action* (2004).

Complementing the scholarly work is Crosby's commitment to the profession of psychology and to the application of psychology to social problems. She has been especially active in the Society for the Psychological Study of Social Issues (serving as its President from 1991-2) and in the International Society for Social Justice (serving as its President from 2002-2004). She is the founder of the Nag's Heart Conference Series which has now held over 50 residential conferences for feminist scholars and professionals.

Crosby has been honored for her scholarship and her activism. She was the recipient of numerous professional awards including the Carolyn Wood Sherif Award and the Kurt Lewin Award, both from the American Psychological Association. In May 2001, Ball State University bestowed on Crosby an honorary Doctor of Laws degree in recognition of how her scholarship and advocacy have helped transform the academy.

Since 1997, Crosby has been Professor of Psychology at University of California, Santa Cruz. Previous appointments included Rhode Island College (1976-77) where she was an instructor; Yale University (1977-85) where she was Assistant Professor and then Associate Professor; The Kellogg School of Management (1992-93) where she held the Adeline Barry Davee Chair; and Smith College (1985 - 1998) where she was Professor.

Faye Crosby is an outstanding teacher. Students at Yale College, at Smith College, at Kellogg and at UCSC have all conferred awards on Crosby for her exceptional teaching.

Crosby is currently the chair of the Academic Senate at the University of California, Santa Cruz.
