(2) For 2007 and 2008, the Asian American category includes applicants who declared themselves as Chinese, East Indian/Pakistani, Japanese, Korean, Vietnamese, and other Asian. For 2009, the category includes applicants who declared themselves as Asian Indian, Bangladeshi, Cambodian, Chinese, Hmong, Indonesian, Japanese, Korean, Laotian, Malaysian, Pakistani, Sri Lankan, Taiwanese, Thai, Vietnamese, and other Asian.

(3) For 2007 and 2008, the Pacific Islander was broadly defined. The drop seen for 2009 may be due to the more narrowly defined categories of: Fijian, Guamanian/Chamorro, Hawaiian, Samoan, Tongan, and other Pacific Islanders as well as options for applicants to declare themselves as one of the new Asian categories.

(4) Decline to state include students who did not provide information on their ethnic identity in the admission application.
