



One of the most beautiful campuses in the world, Santa Cruz's physical setting is a blend of award-winning architecture in a natural environment of redwood forests and open meadows. Established in 1965, the Santa Cruz campus is located above the Monterey Bay on 2,000 acres of redwood forest and open meadow that once formed part of the historic Cowell Ranch.

Some 90 percent of Santa Cruz students are undergraduates, who pursue more than 45 traditional and interdisciplinary undergraduate majors in the arts, engineering, humanities, natural sciences, physical sciences, and social sciences. The undergraduate major in global economics requires international field study, a unique aspect of the program within the UC system.

Santa Cruz graduates enjoy a high acceptance rate into graduate and professional schools. About 80 percent of Santa Cruz seniors are accepted into one or more of their graduate school choices, and the percentage that go on to earn doctorate degrees is among the highest in the nation.

Economic Impacts

UC Santa Cruz, the largest single employer in Santa Cruz County, was responsible for nearly a billion dollars of economic activity in Santa Cruz County in the 2002-03 year.

Because the majority of the campus budget each year is supplied by out-of-county sources, the money spent by UCSC and its employees and students is nearly all new to the local economy.

With over 100 employees and funding for current research tasks at about \$18 million, The University Affiliated Research Center (UARC) at Moffett Field has quickly become a dynamic center of activity for the University of California, Santa Cruz, in the heart of Silicon Valley. Managed by UC Santa Cruz in partnership with NASA Ames Research Center under a 10-year, \$330 million contract between UC and NASA, the UARC has received an excellent performance rating from NASA during its first year of operation. UC researchers, both at UARC facilities and at several UC campuses, are now working together with NASA Ames researchers on a broad range of NASA projects in areas such as air traffic management, human space exploration and nanotechnology. UC Santa Cruz is planning to build on the success of the UARC by establishing a technology and management complex for research and education in the NASA Research Park.

UCSC Extension is the continuing education provider of the Santa Cruz campus, serving students from Santa Clara, Santa Cruz, Monterey, and San Benito Counties. A self-supporting nonprofit organization, Extension offers more than 2,000 courses to 30,000 enrollments yearly.
