Entry Level Writing Requirement Fall 2013

The following report is forwarded in compliance with Section 66015.10 of the Education Code, which states:

- (a) The University of California is requested to annually notify the governing board of each high school of both of the following:
 - (1) The number of graduates who enrolled in the university in the previous year and the number of graduates who were required to take the entry level writing requirement.
 - (2) The comparable numbers of all California high school graduates who enrolled in the University.
- (b) The university of California is requested to provide an annual summary of the information specified in subdivision (a) to the Department of Finance and the Joint Legislative Budget Committee.

This document is the annual report responding to this legislative request.

Background

The University of California Entry Level Writing Requirement (formerly known as the Subject A requirement) is a reading and writing proficiency requirement that is intended to assure that entering freshman students have the writing skills necessary to succeed in lower-division University-level courses. UC students must be able to understand and to respond adequately to written material typical of reading assignments in freshman courses, and this ability must be demonstrated in student writing that communicates effectively to University faculty.

The Academic Senate's University Committee on Preparatory Education (UCOPE) oversees the Entry Level Writing Requirement (ELWR). This requirement may be satisfied by successfully completing a course or program of study in English composition during the first year of enrollment at UC. In addition, prior to enrollment at the University of California, a student may satisfy the ELWR by attaining a score approved by the Committee on one of the following examinations:

- 1. the University of California Analytical Writing Placement Exam (formerly known as the Subject A Examination),
- 2. the SAT Reasoning Test, Writing section,
- 3. the ACT Combined English/Writing test,
- 4. the Advanced Placement English Language and Composition Examination,
- 5. the Advanced Placement English Literature and Composition Examination, or
- 6. the International Baccalaureate Higher or Standard Level Examination in English (Language A only).

An additional option for completing the writing requirement prior to enrollment at the University is the successful completion of a transferable college-level course in English composition of 3 semester or 4 quarter units.

Each May, the University offers its Analytical Writing Placement Examination (AWPE) to incoming freshman who have not satisfied the Entry Level Writing Requirement by that date. The AWPE defines a basic level of proficiency in reading and writing for incoming students and sets a baseline of expectations that extends across all UC campuses. As the University Committee on Preparatory Education (UCOPE) observed at its April 2002 meeting, "it is very important to have a single University of California standard that clearly communicates to students, parents, teachers, and schools the academic reading and writing abilities expected of entering freshmen."

This report summarizes the outcomes of the Entry Level Writing Requirement for freshman students who entered the University for the fall 2013 term and provides fall 2012 data as a point of comparison (see attached tables).

Information to Schools

The University annually notifies each California high school, county and district superintendent that comprehensive ELWR performance results are available on the AWPE Result website (at http://www.ucop.edu/cgi-bin/elwr/results.pl). These results may be useful to guide high school curriculum development that could improve the academic preparation of students.

The AWPE website (at http://www.ucop.edu/elwr/) contains previously administered examinations, the scoring guide, and annotated sample student essays with reader comments exemplifying each scoring level. These resources are intended to help clarify the ELWR standard of competence.

Entry Level Writing Requirement (ELWR) Data on Entering Freshmen

The attached tables display ELWR data for fall 2012 and 2013 entering freshmen.

Of the 33,221 freshman students who entered the University for the fall 2013 term, 73.0 percent (24,241) met the Entry Level Writing Requirement prior to fall enrollment. This percent is up slightly from the fall 2012 outcome of 72.6 percent (24,108) for newly enrolling students. The percent of fall 2013 entrants who fulfilled the ELWR includes both students who met the requirement through other means prior to entry – 56.2 percent of entrants (18,674) – and students who successfully passed the Analytical Writing Placement Examination (5,567, or 16.8 percent).

The proportion of students who met the ELWR through other means prior to enrollment rose from 53.6 percent (17,785) in 2012 to 56.2 percent (18,674) in 2013. While the AWPE pass rate for fall 2013 dropped slightly from fall 2012, a smaller proportion of students actually took the exam; 40.7 percent took the exam (13,536 examinees out of 33,221 enrollees) compared to 42.7 percent of the 2012 cohort (14,181 examinees out of 33,193 enrollees). The AWPE pass rate for fall 2013 was 41.4 percent (5,567 students passed the exam out of 13,536 examinees) and the pass rate for fall 2012 was 44.5 percent (6,323 students passed the exam out of 14,181 examinees). Therefore, the total number and percent of students who did not fulfill the ELWR requirement prior to fall term enrollment decreased slightly; 27.0 percent, or 8,980 students will be required to meet the ELWR during their first year of enrollment at the University compared to 27.4 percent, or 9,085 students in 2012.

The percent of entering students who fulfilled the ELWR requirement prior to enrollment differs by UC eligibility status. In fall 2012, 73.1 percent (23,984) of regularly admitted freshman enrollees satisfied the ELWR prior to entry, compared to 32.9 percent (124) of enrolled students admitted by exception. For fall 2013, the completion rate rose slightly for regularly admitted enrollees (73.3 percent, 24,155), and the completion rate for enrolled students admitted by exception dropped to 31.4 percent (86 students).

The percentage of all fall students who fulfilled the ELWR requirement prior to enrollment varies by campus. In 2013, this ranged from a high of 89.2 percent at UC Los Angeles compared to 40.6 percent at UC Merced. This pattern closely mirrors individual campus applicant pools and selectivity rates and is consistent across both years.

Passing the Analytical Writing Placement Exam is one method of satisfying the ELWR prior to enrollment, and it is the method of satisfaction most used to succeed after not achieving satisfactory scores on other tests. A student who has not satisfied the ELWR prior to enrollment must do so as early as possible during their first year of attendance by enrolling in a specific course leading to satisfaction of the requirement. The following tables display information regarding the fulfillment of the ELWR for new entering freshmen from California high schools for fall 2012 and fall 2013.
