We welcome debate, we expect disagreement, and we value opportunities for reasoned exchange that enhance understanding of differing perspectives. But acts of violence, harassment, and intimidation are not appropriate, and the campuses have policies and procedures in place for addressing issues of this kind.

The chancellors and I are committed to preserving a campus environment in which free speech is exercised vigorously, without infringing upon the rights or personal safety of others. We hope you will join us in this cause and will do your part to maintain the University as a place where issues may be debated openly and safely and where, in the end, we may all learn from each other.
