DEFINITION OF MILITARY SCIENCE (ARMY ROTC)

Army Reserve Officer's Training Corps is a unique elective course of study, taken in conjunction with any academic major, that leads to a commission as a 2nd Lieutenant in the United States Army, Army Reserves, or National Guard upon graduation. ROTC is open to all men and women enrolled as full time students. Military Science classes enhance your regular academic schedule with practical leadership and management experience not available in a normal classroom environment.

OBLIGATIONS

Students enrolled in the first two years of the program, without a scholarship, have no military obligation. ROTC classes are taken for academic elective credit.

Juniors/seniors voluntarily continuing in ROTC to commissioning will incur a combined total obligation of eight years. The combination can include Active Duty, Reserve or National Guard, or a combination of Active and Reserve Forces duty. (Both active and inactive)

BENEFITS OF ROTC

Think of Army ROTC as a leadership development program that will qualify you to serve as an officer/leader in one of the most respected institutions in the World - the United States Army. As an Army Officer you can expect to serve in exciting and challenging positions leading soldiers in locations all across the globe. While serving your country and earning the respect of your peers, you will also enhance your personal wealth by acquiring recognized leadership experience and earning a competitive salary. You can elect to serve in the active Army, the Army Reserve or the Army National Guard. We also offer financial assistance, full tuition scholarships and special programs for veterans to help finance your education.

FINANCIAL SUPPORT AND ROTC SCHOLARSHIPS

Scholarships that provide payment for all academically related fees, tuition, and books are available. Four, three, and two year scholarships are awarded.

Key dates to remember:

- *Four Year Scholarship applicants (High School Seniors) - request scholarship application between August 1 and December 1. Contact the Army ROTC Enrollment Office at UC Davis (530-752-7682) or Web address: <http://www-rotc.monroe.army.mil/scholarships/scholarships.htm> for an application.
- *Four Year Nurse Scholarship applicants - Same as above.
- *Two and Three Year Scholarship applicants - Applications are accepted throughout the school year at the Army ROTC Enrollment Office at UC Davis. Contact our office for processing schedule.

Each scholarship and contracted ROTC student receives a \$250-400 monthly subsistence allowance, tax free.

ROTC books, supplies and uniforms are provided free.

ROTC MODIFICATIONS TO MEET YOUR NEEDS

A normal four year program, Army ROTC allows students to take one Military Science Course each quarter as part of the normal academic load required by your major. Military Science classes provide elective credits towards your degree.

Optional programs to meet special needs include:

The Two-Year Program. A program specifically designed for students who have not participated in ROTC during their first two years of college. It requires attendance at a paid five week summer camp normally between the sophomore and junior years of college, with enrollment in ROTC during the junior and senior years of college. Most students are offered 2-year scholarships after successfully completing the camp.

Partnership Program. Students enrolled at other four-year campuses or junior colleges may enroll in our classes here at UC Davis by concurrent enrollment through the University Extension Program.

VETERANS

ROTC makes the most of time and experience veterans have gained from active duty and reserve time by allowing credit for the Basic Course and direct enrollment into the Advanced Course of ROTC training.

In addition to any financial assistance received from ROTC, veterans are still qualified to receive any and all VEAP/GI Bill/Army College Fund benefits to which they are entitled.

Simultaneous Membership Program allows students to become members of the Army Reserves or Army National Guard while enrolled in Army ROTC. Advanced ROTC SMP students are paid for their Reserve/Guard training, plus they receive the ROTC allowance of up to \$400 monthly for each academic month for two years in the Advanced Course.

EXTRACURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

ROTC is academics and more. Practical leadership and management skills are emphasized. Students plan and conduct much of the ROTC training and are given positions of responsibility in special clubs and activities. Club participation is voluntary and adds an extra dimension of enjoyable and challenging activities to college life. Some of these activities include rappelling, orienteering and marksmanship.

UC DAVIS

- ◆ is known as the "friendly campus" with its wide-open spaces, tree-lined streets, and more than 40,000 bicycles within the city of Davis
- ◆ is located 15 miles west of Sacramento, with easy access to Lake Tahoe and San Francisco
- ◆ has approximately 26,000 students, of whom 21,000 are undergraduates

- ◆ costs approximately \$16,665 per year per student, but may vary depending upon housing costs, personal lifestyle, etc.

- ◆ has one of the most outstanding intramural sports programs anywhere
- ◆ has extensive advising and counseling services for students who need help in choosing a major or career, developing better study skills, or sorting out personal problems
- ◆ has over 300 social, political, service, religious, and ethnic clubs and organizations on campus
- ◆ has one of the largest Work-Learn programs in the nation, with hundreds of full and part-time internships for students.
