UCSB EAOP AT A GLANCE: FUNDING MODEL TERMINOLOGY

- Cost Sharing: School "shares" in costs of operations or portion of salary. FTE is permanently funded, creates salary savings opportunity, resources then used for associated pre-college programming costs. \$25K/yr/HS.
- ► Co-Funding: School or District is "co-funding" a portion of salary and/or pre-college programming costs, FTE is not fully funded by Permanent Budget. \$35K-\$50K/yr/FTE.
- Fee For Service: District pays for services provided by EAOP FTE, position not funded by Permanent Budget, Budget Office Benefits-Taxes-Fees included in costs to sustain & support position. Estimated costs \$80-95K/yr/FTE.
- Revenue Enhancement: All sources of fees (money) that are generated in compensation for the provision of University resources and/or services are considered "revenue." Revenue generates taxes & fees for campus Budget Office. Currently revenue enhancement models are considered UCOP positive.

Cost Sharing

2005 SMBSD co-funds \$20K/Yr, Innovation Grant, I EAOP FTE serving 4 MS in K-8 District

- 2007 OHS/RMHS cofunded CSC @ \$25K/Yr/HS, HS site budgets used, I EAO FTE = 2 FTE
- 2012-2014 co-funded or cost sharing at \$25K to \$35K/Yr/HS at all EAOP Partnership HS

Co-Funding

2015 all Districts contribute min \$35K/Yr/HS up to \$50K/Yr/FTE

- 2015-16 budget cycle projected revenues of \$370K
- 2016 Budget Office Benefits+Fees+Taxes, SA Division Fees+Taxes, and **UCOP** Initiatives are significantly impacting **EAOP** operations & funding model options

Forward Fee for Service

- 2017 Forward, Fee for Service/"Revenue ∞**ŏ** Enhancement" model
- 2017 Projected cost \$80-\$95K/Yr/FTE, includes Salary+Benefits+Taxes+F ees+EAOP programming
 - HS counselors starting Salary+Benefits vary from \$102K-\$130K/Yr/FTE depending on District

UCSB EAOP AT A GLANCE: CRITICAL FACTORS FOR SUCCESSFUL FUNDING MODEL

- ▶ Staffing Model- I EAOP CSC FTE permanently assigned, .25% EAOP ASC FTE assists monthly, and Continual Value Added Benefits & Sphere of Influence.
- Year Round Services- Sustained daily, College Going Initiatives for 9-12th regardless of college eligibility status, and CC eligible students largest growth opportunity population.
- **Extensive Professional Development** Resident Expert Role, Value Added Benefits for all students, parents, counselors, and high quality customer service.
- **Enhances & Supplements** Current school efforts, CSC are Academic Advisors, Transcript Evaluation is Foundation of all Services, and immediate impact player.
- Data & Reporting SAPEP, Principals Report, A-G Eligibility Report, UC Application, Admissions, Enrollment Reports, College Going Enrollment Rates, Satisfaction Surveys, Press Releases, and News & Video Stories.

► January – March:

Discussions and Proposals

► March – May:

May - June:

Program implementation, reporting, preparation for new agreement cycles



UCSB EAOP AT A GLANCE: CONTRACTING & PAYMENT SCHEDULES

- ► Contracts started as EAOP service agreements w/Service Schools
- ▶ UC/UCSB Contracts now set for 2 years in duration, considering 3-4 years in future
- CANRA Language, Insurance, Indemnification, Services Provided, School Resource
 Obligations, Data Access, Classroom Access, Payment Schedule
- Must be approved by Campus Contracts Office, District Management, District Legal Council, School Boards
- Payment Schedule and Billing Process- I/Month, I/Bi-Monthly, I/Quarter, I/Bi-Annually, I/Year

To be considered for the Early Academic Outreach Program (EAOP), students must meet certain academic requirements and progress toward college eligibility. Priority consideration for enrollment is given to students who are the first in their family to pursue a college career and to low-income students. The following are EAOP activities conducted for the school by EAOP College Site Coordinators in conjunction with EAOP Academic Service Coordinators. Site Coordinators may also provide additional activities to promote a college-going culture.

SEPTEMBER Event Set-up and Student Advising

- Coordinate Counselor Breakfast, facilitate collaboration between Pre-College Programs and Counseling Department, and implementation of college prep activities (Cash for College, etc)
- Contact students on track for four-year college eligibility
- Promote PSAT/SAT/ACT/SAT Subject Test registration
- Assist as needed w/PSAT Workshop & follow-up
- ▶ Provide UC/CSU/CC information to students, parents, school staff & administrators
- Present on four college systems & admissions requirements to all A-G on track students
- Collaborate w/School Admin & Counseling team to coordinate and implement Parent Workshops



UCSB EAOP AT A GLANCE: LEGITIMATE & FORMAL: EMBEDDING AGREEMENTS

WASC Accreditation & Improvement Plans

Include EAOP services and College Site Coordinator role in school site WASC plans, EAOP staff have been on WASC Committees, Have met w/WASC representatives, currently embedded in two WASC plans.

► Local Control Funding Formula

Allows for additional resource opportunities for Districts to enhance and supplement special efforts for high need populations. These resources now fund all EAOP FTE positions.

Local Control Accountability Plan

Inclusion in College and Career Readiness Sections. Have provided annual EAOP/Higher Ed outcome data. EAOP is now embedded in all six service District LCAPs.





EAOP Completion of A-G Course Pattern at Graduation



EAOP Completion of Entrance Exams



UCSB EAOP AT A GLANCE: ENROLLED STUDENT OUTCOMES

- 3,794 Transcripts were evaluated by five EAOP College Site Coordinators during the 2014-15 academic year in order to establish the students A-G on track eligibility status for grades 9th 12th
- 1,347 9th 12th grade students were enrolled in EAOP at the 8 services schools
- A total of 2,262 EAOP services were provided to eight high schools
- 31% of all EAOP services provided were focused on university application, completions of the FAFSA/Dream Application, and (705 Services) matriculation assistance
- 31% of all EAOP services provided were Classroom Presentations (704 Services)
- 46% of ALL students, grades 9-12th, in eight high schools received at least 2 services from EAOP, or 6,018 students
- 84% all students, grades 9-12th, in four high schools received at least 2 services from EAOP, or 4,846 students
- 180 seniors participated in EAOP's College Readiness Academies (CRA) from June to August 2015
