



Immigration Spectrum





Defining our terms

Undocumented: individual who doesn't have a legal right to be or remain in the United States



Laws and Policies

Education Policies	Immigration-related policies
AB540	DACA
AB130 & 131 (CA DREAM Act)	TPS



California Education Legislation

AB 540 CA DREAM Act

To qualify for AB 540 status, you must have:

- Attended a high school (public or private) in California for **three years** (six semesters) or more
- Graduated from a California high school or attained the equivalent (GED)
- California Nonresident Tuition Exemption Form) with your college or university stating you have or will file an application to legalize as soon as you are able to do so
- AB2000 (2015) and SB68 (2017) have expanded AB540 eligibility

- AB130: Allows AB540 undocumented students attending public colleges and universities to receive scholarships derived from non-state funds, which include many private scholarships.
- AB131: Allows AB540 undocumented students to apply for Cal Grants and grants and scholarships awarded by California public colleges and universities.

Impact of CA Dream Act

At UC Davis:

Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals DACA

• June 15, 2012: DHS announced certain youth who were brought into the United States as minors and meet certain requirements, will be given "deferred action" (Protection for Deportation) for two years.

Eligibility

- Born after June 15, 1981
- Arrival before 16th birthday
- Qualifying education or military status
- Continuous residence since June 15, 2007
- No severe criminal history
- Present without lawful status on 6/15/12

Benefits

- Temporary protection from deportation
- Permission to work
- Social Security Number
- CA Driver's License / CA I.D. Card
- Medi-Cal (if otherwise eligible)
- Possible to travel abroad

What Deferred Action is NOT:

- Permanent
- Guaranteed
- A law
- Legal immigration status
- A pathway to lawful permanent resident status or U.S. citizenship




Temporary Protected Status

- 25 year old program that allowed nationals of certain countries to temporarily live/work in U.S. due to:
 - Armed Conflict
 - Natural Disaster
 - Other temporary or extraordinary event
- O DHS revoked TPS for Haiti, Nicaragua, Sudan in fall 2017
- O El Salvador, Nepal, Honduras and Somalia have also been slated for revocation within next two years




How Do Students Identify?

Trauma-based problems

- Migratory trauma
 - opre-migration, migration, post migration
 - Interpersonal violence
 - Deportation fear
- O Depression, Anxiety, PTSD
- O Difficulties with trust and safety
- O Difficulties with ethnic identity

Positive Messages to tell Students

- "You belong here like everybody else."
- "Don't isolate yourself. Connect with others through academics, spiritual guidance, sports, cultural values, identity."
- "Voice your needs to professors, university staff, counselors and peers."
- "Define your own identity, your values, your goals. Who you are as a person is not defined by your status."
- "Ask for help." medical, psychological, tutoring, academic
- "Remember you are a role model for many people."

 - O Legal Fellow (UC Immigrant Legal Services Center)
 - Campus Scholarships/funding open to DREAM Act applicants
 - O Know Your Rights materials (UCOP)

- if you are subject to an immigration order or inquiry on campus
- if you need information about your legal rights
