Background

Preciously the University Community Engagement Grant funds were used for the Parent University at Luther Burbank. We are requesting an amendment to the original proposal in order to be able to use the funds for 2015-16 at two different schools and transplant the concept of a parent university while customizing it to meet the needs of the two distinct communities one being rural (Pioneer High School) and one being urban (Sacramento Charter High School).

The mission of the Early Academic Outreach Program is to contribute to educational equity and access by motivating and preparing students to pursue and succeed in postsecondary opportunities. To ensure the success of EAOP participants, a multifaceted approach is used to provide students with the knowledge, resources, and tools, needed to be the most successful and competitive applicant when applying to college. Through engaging workshops, individualized academic planning, and a student centered approach, EAOP is committed to student success. In addition to working with students, we highly value the role that parents and families play in ensuring the success of their student. Parental involvement is critical to the social, emotional, psychological, and educational success of all students. An absence of parental involvement is one of the factors that has a significant negative impact upon students success.

Parental involvement, while typically viewed as parents showing up to school activities and events, it is important to remember that involvement includes, but is not limited to school functions. Involvement includes assistance with homework, a stable and positive home environment, as well social and emotional support that contributes to the success of the student.

All of the programs, workshops and information that will be shared at Parent University, will center around the current research that exist about best practices in education and parent involvement programs. The research and work of educational experts, such as Dr. Joyce Epstein, Dr. Rex Fortune, Ann A. Brown, and other professionals, will serve as a guide to ensure programs and materials are aligned with best practices for success.

Dr. Joyce Epstein's research on the six types of involvement, will also be a critical component of the Parent University program. Dr. Epstein's framework for parent involvement includes the following six types of involvement:

OBJECTIVE:

To provide college related information in Spanish to parents of English Learners. As well as introduce then to strategies on how to better support their children during their post-secondary journey.

DESCRIPTION:

The Pioneer High School Parent University will begin with an all-day (8:30-3:00) conference with breakfast, lunch, and childcare provided (if needed interpreters will be provided). Some of the potential topics could be: A-G requirements, college making it happen, importance of parent involvement, and leadership development. A pre and post survey will be used to track the development of the participants. One of the main sessions will be to generate topics from the parents for the monthly sessions during the year (once per month). Interpreters will be provided to English speaking parent that request one.

A committee of no more than 10 parents will be developed from the conference participants to help develop and implement the workshops from the topics that the parents suggest.

The workshops will take place once a month in the evening. Dinner and childcare will be provided for each session. The final session will be an evening celebration with dinner and certificates of completion presented to participants who attended a minimum of 4 sessions.

The parent participants will be invited to participate in a minimum of two campus visits. The decision of where to go will be made by the planning committee and budget constraints.

Each of the planning committee members will be encourage to take the *Strengths Finder* assessment. This tool will be used to help the team work together more effectively and to help individuals develop professionally and personally. The sessions will be delivered by a Gallup Certified Strengths Coach.

OUTCOMES:

- Understand A-G knowledge and proper sequence of classes
- Understanding eligibility vs. competitive eligibility
- Enhance the families college going culture
- Strengths development and understand their Top Five Themes
- Advocacy skills development
- Understanding of financial aid options

<u>Goals</u>

The goal of the Parent University program is to provide parents and families at Sacramento Charter High School (SCHS) with the knowledge, tools and resources to best support their student's preparation toward postsecondary education. Sacramento Charter HS is an independent 9-12th grade charter school, run by the St. Hope Academy. St. Hope Academy also runs other elementary and middle school charter programs. EAOP reestablished a partnership with SCHS in the Fall 2014, to provide additional services to support the college prep curriculum that the school offers to over 900, low income and underrepresented students. African American and Latino students, make up over 70 percent of the total enrolled population. Over 73 percent of the students qualify for free or reduced lunch.

Parent University will complement the already existing services that EAOP offers including a full service outreach program, the summer Ujima Academy, and a proposed school wide after school program.

Current data and research shows that students who have strong support and parental involvement from home, are much more likely to excel academically. Through this program, we hope that participants will be able to:

- Better support their student as they prepare for higher education
- Gain additional knowledge and skills to strengthen relationships with their students
- Become active and engaged in the decision making process of their students school site
- Connect parents to community resources, programs and support systems
- Create a network of parental support with other parents
- Engage parents in understanding the importance of educational advocacy and their rights as a
 parent
