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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY*

The 1997-98 Student Expenses and Resources Survey (SEARS) is the tenth of its kind to be completed since the original Student Resources Survey of 1972. A total of 6,564 students from all nine University of California campuses participated in the 1997-98 SEARS.

UNDERGRADUATES

GRADUATE STUDENTS

- ♦ The proportion of undergraduates with loans rose slightly from 1994-95 to 52.9% in 1997-98. The average loan (among those students who borrowed) fell from \$4,893 to \$4,660, after being adjusted for inflation.
- ♦ There was a decrease in the percentage of graduate students who had any previous debt: from 65.7% in 1994-95 to 62.2% in 1997-98. Among students who did borrow there was an increase in the median constant dollar amount borrowed, from \$16,220 in 1994-95 to \$17,952 in 1997-98.
- ♦ The median housing expenses changed very little from 1994-95 to 1997-98. After accounting for inflation, students living on-campus paid an average of \$685 per month for housing and food, compared to \$650 per month in 1994-95. Off-campus students paid an average of \$462 per month in housing, compared to \$423 per month in 1994-95.
- ♦ Overall, housing expenses increased from 1994-95 to 1997-98. Housing expenses rose for on-campus graduate students (from \$604 to \$691 per month in 1997 dollars). Off-campus housing expenses also increased to \$577 per month in 1997-98.
- ♦ Overall, food expenses rose for all budget categories. Commuters paid an average of \$104 per month for food, compared to \$63 per month in 1994-95. Students living off-campus paid \$200 per month compared to \$161 per month in 1994-95. This change may be due, in part, to changes in food expense questions in the 1997-98 questionnaire.
- ♦ Food expenses increased by \$50-\$75 for all budget categories. Commuters paid \$302 per month in food expenses in 1997-98, compared to \$250 per month in 1994-95. Graduate students living off-campus paid an average of \$272 per month in food in 1997-98, which is about \$60 more than the inflation-adjusted expense for the 1994-95 survey.
- ♦ Books and school supplies expenses rose in 1997-98, compared to the inflation-adjusted expenses for 1994-95. Undergraduates spent an average of \$794 on books and school supplies. The 1997-98 book expense was separated from the supplies expense for the first time.
- ♦ Books and school supplies expenses increased in 1997-98, after rising dramatically between 1998-89 and 1991-92 and then dropping in 1994-95. Graduate students spent an average of \$636 on books and school supplies during the academic year, compared to \$575 in 1994-95 (in 1997 dollars).
- ♦ Local transportation expenses increased slightly, with commuters paying \$81 per month in local transportation and off-campus students paying \$34 per month. In 1994-95, commuters paid \$61 per month and off-campus undergraduates paid \$24 per month in local transportation expenses.
- ♦ In 1997-98, local transportation expenses rose to \$95 for commuters and fell slightly to \$32 for students living off-campus. In 1994-95, commuters paid \$65 per month and off-campus graduate students paid \$32 per month in local transportation expenses.

SURVEY DESCRIPTION

The 1997-98 Student Expenses and Resources Survey (SEARS) is the tenth of its kind to be completed since the original Student Resources Survey of 1972. This survey is conducted to gather information on student expenses and resources. The University then uses the data to gain a better understanding of these topics, as well as to inform policy decisions. In addition, SEARS collects demographic data and information on topics of special interest. The survey instrument is a mail-out questionnaire that is sent to a randomly selected group of undergraduate and graduate students on each of the nine campuses. **Appendix A** contains a copy of the survey instrument.

Since SEARS is administered every three years and much of the survey instrument has remained the same, SEARS affords the opportunity for trend analysis. This is especially true for certain expenses and resources, such as housing expenses, parent income, and student employment. Moreover, as SEARS is a stratified random sample, comparisons can be made among different groups of students: students with and without financial aid, dependent and independent students, students from different ethnic backgrounds, etc.

SEARS is conducted as a collaborative effort between the California Student Aid Commission (CSAC), the California community colleges, the California State University (CSU), the University of California (UC), the Association of Independent California Colleges and Universities (AICCU), and the California Association of Private Postsecondary Schools (representing the private career colleges). For UC, the Student Financial Support unit had the responsibility of managing the survey.

Representativeness of sample/response rate

As it has been in past administrations of SEARS, the response rate was an important concern in the design of the survey. During early stages of survey development, the multi-segmental committee and CSAC took a number of steps to increase the response rate for the 1997-98 survey. Questions asking for information available from University databases (e.g., race, gender, campus, student level, and grant and loan aid) were eliminated. The number of questionnaire mailings was reduced from three to two, as past survey administrations had

shown that the marginal benefit of a third mailing was not worth the additional cost. Instead, more resources were focused on the telephone reminder calls and phone surveys of students who had not returned the mail questionnaire. Lastly, the UC (as well as the community colleges) offered a cash prize as an incentive for students to return the completed questionnaires.

The University first made proactive efforts to increase the survey response rate in 1991-92, after student responses fell from 44% in 1985-86 to 40% in 1988-89. Although the 1991-92 survey instrument was redesigned to increase readability and included discount coupons for two California amusement parks, the response rate declined to 38.6%. Declining response rates were addressed again in 1994-95 with the implementation of three primary tactics. First, most students were sent a shorter questionnaire (expense questions were omitted). Second, a clear deadline was stated on the survey. Finally, prize incentives were offered (one \$500 grand prize and two \$100 first prizes) to students who returned their completed questionnaire by the deadline. The overall response rate increased from 39% to 47%. As there was only a minor difference in the response rates for the long and short versions of the questionnaire, the 1997-98 survey relied on cash incentives as the primary method to increase student responses.




Figure 1: Response rates, 1988-89 to 1997-98

As shown in Figure 1, above, the response rate to the 1997-98 survey actually decreased, compared to 1994-95, to just 41%. All of the postsecondary segments that participated in the survey had lower response rates compared to 1994-95, however the reasons remain unclear. Possible explanations are currently being investigated to inform the design of future surveys.

The survey pool was based on a stratified random sample, drawn from all students (excluding residents in the health sciences) listed in the Fall 1997 corporate files. The final sample consisted of 16,175 students. Students were selected by student level, campus, and ethnicity, with various populations being oversampled to assure adequate representation. The final number of respondents was 6,564. Undergraduates had a response rate of 38.9%, compared to 42.4% for graduate students. Response rates also varied by campus and ethnicity. Graduate students at Santa Cruz had the lowest response rate (34.4%), while undergraduate students at San Francisco had the highest response rate (65.7%) (see Table 1). As in 1994-95, African American students were the least likely to respond (36.2%) of any ethnic group. Native American students responded at the highest rate (43.7%).

Appendix B, Tables B1 and B2 present the sample size, response rate, and number of respondents by campus, student level and ethnicity.

Non-response bias

Response bias is always a possibility in survey research, particularly when the response rate is not very high. It is important to determine whether respondents were somehow different from non-respondents. In order to address this issue, a database of the entire SEARS sample (respondents and non-respondents) was developed that included registration elements (e.g.,

age, gender, units attempted, and grade point average) pulled from the Corporate Student System.

Respondents appear to be very similar to non-respondents, particularly in terms of grade point average and California residency (see **Appendix C, Table C1**). For example, undergraduate respondents had a median GPA of 2.86, while undergraduate non-respondents had a median GPA of 2.81. For graduate students the differences were also minimal (3.80 and 3.75, for respondents and non-respondents, respectively).

A comparison was also made of the parent income (as indicated on their application for admission) between new California freshmen respondents and non-respondents. The median parent income of non-respondents was over 33% greater than that of respondents (\$57,105 versus \$42,829). This is consistent with results from the 1994-95 survey, which found that the parent income of non-respondents was over 20% greater than that of respondents (\$47,978 versus \$39,421).

A comparison of other undergraduate characteristics suggests that there may be some additional bias in the sample. To explore this possibility, both respondents and non-respondents were matched to the university financial aid database. Aid recipients responded at a higher rate than non aid-recipients (41% versus 33%), resulting in a respondent pool comprised of 75% aid recipients and 25% non aid-recipients. In contrast, the sample consisted of 70% aid recipients and 30% non aid-recipients (results not presented here). Since aid recipients have a lower parent income than non-aid recipients (roughly \$46,000 compared to \$96,000), this may help explain the parent income bias described above.

Sampling error

The questionnaire was mailed to over 16,000 students, a sample of the population of 165,195 undergraduates and graduate students who attended the university in the first term of the 1997-98 academic year. In addition to non-response bias, another type of bias that can occur in survey research is sampling error. This occurs when responses from those individuals in the sample are not representative of the responses that would have been obtained if the whole population had been surveyed.

Upon completion of the survey, one way to gauge the extent of sampling error is to measure how close the sample values are to the "true" mean of the entire population (i.e., the mean that would result if data were collected from every student). This measurement found that the mean undergraduate parent income for most of the campuses (excluding San Francisco because of the small population size) was between 7.1% and 9.5% of the population mean at a 95% confidence level; for graduate students the range was 6.7% to 10.8% (see Table 2). That is, there is a 95% chance that the mean parent income for students from UCLA, for example, is within 7.7% of the "true" mean if all students had responded. In terms of dollars, the annual income estimate is within \$4,395 for UCLA students.

Appendix D Table D1 includes the confidence intervals by student level and campus. It also compares the 1997-98 confidence intervals with those from the 1994-95 SEARS.

Another method used to gauge sampling error is to compare characteristics of the respondents with those of the population (see **Appendix C, Table C2**). Three available data elements were particularly useful in comparing the student population to survey respondents: gender, California residency, and parent income. There were only small differences between respondents and the student population in terms of gender composition and residency status. However, the results of the parent income data show that the median parent income of freshmen respondents was \$57,973, compared to a median parent income of \$72,396 for the entire population of new California freshmen. This suggests that freshmen with lower parent incomes could be over-represented in the sample and, therefore, analyses related to parent income must be interpreted with caution (i.e., parent income may be underestimated). Further research must be done to determine the cause and the extent of this bias.

In-depth analysis of sampling error at the campus level revealed a problem with the Berkeley sample. The Berkeley undergraduate sample appears non-representative as it differs substantially from the population with regard to class year (i.e., freshmen, sophomore, junior, senior). Specifically, 6.3% of the Berkeley undergraduate sample were freshmen compared to 20.6% in the total Berkeley undergraduate population. Because class year affects many of the variables under study (e.g., dependency status, housing patterns, etc.), the Berkeley data should be interpreted with caution. For this reason, tables presented in this report include systemwide totals calculated both with and without Berkeley.

Section A: Dependency Status

Undergraduates

There was a small increase in the proportion of independent undergraduates from 16% in 1994-95 to 16.9% (w/o UCB) in 1997-98 (see Appendix E for 1997-98 independent student definition). (*Table A3*)

- *Ethnicity*. Chicano and Latino students had the largest proportions of independent undergraduates (21.9% and 20.2% w/o UCB) and Asian Americans had the lowest proportion (15.3% w/o UCB). (*Table A2*)
- Campus. Most campuses have similar proportions of dependent and independent students. As expected, only 40% of students at UCSF were independent due to the special nature of its undergraduate programs. Although the percentage of independent undergraduate students at Berkeley has traditionally been similar to other campuses, sampling problems in 1997-98 led to a significant increase in the proportion of independent undergraduates to 45.3%. (Table A6)

Graduates

By definition, all graduate students are independent.

Section B: Parent Income

Undergraduates

The median parent income of undergraduates was \$50,761 (\$50,238 w/o UCB). There has been a sharp decrease in the median undergraduate parent income since 1991 when, in constant 1997 dollars, it was \$62,384. (Table B2)

- Dependency. Dependent students (\$55,262) continue to report much higher median parent incomes than their independent counterparts (\$34,241) (see Appendix E for independent student definition). The parent incomes of dependent and independent students, without Berkeley (due to the apparent bias in their sample), were \$53,937 and \$28,657 respectively. The gap in parent income between these two groups is the largest in SEARS history, with the undergraduate median dependent parent income 88% higher than that of independent students. (Table B1)
- *Aid recipient status*. The median parent income of aid recipients was \$33,719, a decrease from the 1994 inflation-adjusted median income of \$41,254. The median parent income of students who were not aid recipients has decreased slightly from \$90,811 in 1994-95 to \$90,244 (\$91,308 w/o UCB). (*Table B4*)
- Ethnicity. Whites reported the highest median parent income (\$72,345 or \$71,061 w/o UCB) while Asian Americans reported the lowest (\$27,681 or \$26,226 w/o UCB). Asian Americans experienced the largest change in parent income with a decrease of more than \$10,000 from the 1994 inflation-adjusted parent income of \$38,295. (Table B6)
- *Campus*. As in the past, parent income was the highest at Santa Barbara, \$63,704. Riverside reported the lowest median parent income, \$33,557, just over one-half the parent income of UCSB. Los Angeles, which had the lowest parent income in the 1991-92 and 1994-95 surveys, reported a median parent income of \$52,722, almost \$2,000 more than the systemwide median of \$50,761. (*Table B8*)

Graduates

The median parent income of graduate students was \$59,246 in 1997, an increase from the inflation-adjusted 1994 median of \$57,464. (*Table B2*)

- *Aid recipient status*. The median parent income of graduate student aid recipients was nearly identical to that of non-aid recipients (\$59,176 and \$59,397 respectively). (*Table B4*)
- *Ethnicity*. Parent income varied by ethnicity with White students reporting the highest median parent income at \$71,801, while Chicanos reported the lowest at \$32,953. In three years, the gap between these two groups has widened from \$29,000 to nearly \$39,000 in constant 1997 dollars. (*Table B6*)
- *Campus*. San Francisco had the highest parent income (\$66,118) and Riverside had the lowest (\$46,942). These results are similar to those found in the two previous survey years. (*Tables B7 and B8*)

Section C: Student Employment

Undergraduates

The employment rate for undergraduates was 59.6% (60.1% w/o UCB). This is the highest employment rate since 1988-89 where 61.5% of undergraduate students were employed. The median number of hours worked per week for those students who were employed during the 1997-98 academic year was 17.1 (16.9 hours w/o UCB). (*Table C3*)

- Dependency status. As expected, independent undergraduate students were employed at a much higher rate than dependent students were (64.4% and 58.3% respectively). Independent employed students also worked more hours (a median of 20.0 hours per week) than employed dependent students (a median of 15.0 hours per week). Systemwide (excluding Berkeley due to the apparent sample bias), the independent and dependent employment rates were 73.8% and 57.4%, respectively. (Table C1)
- Aid recipient status. Aid recipients (62.4%) had a higher employment rate than non-aid recipients (58.3%). Employed non-aid recipients continue to work more hours than employed aid recipients do (a median of 18 hours per week versus 15 hours per week). (Table C2)
- *Ethnicity*. Employment rates varied by ethnicity. Chicanos were employed at the highest rate (73.8%), while Asian Americans were employed at the lowest rate (51.6%). Employed Asian Americans also worked the fewest hours per week on average (15.2 hours), and employed African Americans worked the most hours (an average of 18.3 hours per week). (*Table C4*)
- *Parent income*. The survey found differences in employment rate by parent income. Students whose parent incomes were \$30,000 to \$60,000 were employed at the highest rate (69.4% or 70.1% w/o UCB), while those at the \$90,000 and above level were employed at the lowest rate (51.1% or 51.4% w/o UCB). Students across all parent income levels worked on average the same number of hours per week during the academic year. (*Table C7*)
- *Class year*. The survey also found large variations in employment by class year. While only 40.4% of freshmen were employed, seniors were employed at a rate of 71.5%. Employed freshmen also worked the fewest hours per week on average, while seniors worked the most (13.8 and 17.8 hours per week). (*Table C6*)
- On-campus and Off-campus. Employment rates rose for both on-campus and off-campus employment from 29.2% and 29% in 1994-95 to 36.8% and 32.5%, respectively. Students working off-campus worked on average about five hours more than those who worked on-campus (20.3 hours versus 14.7 hours per week). (Table C9)
- *Campus*. As in the 1991-92 and 1994-95 surveys, Los Angeles had the highest employment rate of the nine campuses (70.9%). The lowest employment rate (not including UCSF) was found at the Santa Barbara campus (46.8% employed). The average hours worked per week ranged from 14.9 (Santa Cruz) to 18.9 hours (Riverside). (*Table C11*)
- Summer employment. As expected, both the percentage of students and the number of hours undergraduates worked increased during the summer months. On average students worked 31.1 hours per week during the summer compared to 16.6 hours per week during the academic year. (*Table C1 and Table C21*)

• *Units attempted and Grade point average*. Students who worked more hours attempted fewer units and had lower grade point averages than students who worked fewer hours or those who did not work during the 1997-98 academic year. (*Table C24*)

Graduates

Graduate students were employed at a rate of 68.4%, a slight decrease from the 1994-95 rate of 69.4%. Employed graduate students worked about the same number of hours as they have in past years (a median of 22.4 hours per week). (*Table C3*)

- Aid recipient status. Aid recipients had a lower rate of employment (66.1%) than non-aid recipients (75.5%). The median hours worked per week for employed non-aid recipients was one hour more than employed aid recipients (23.1 compared to 22.1 hours per week). (*Table C3*)
- *Ethnicity*. White graduate students continue to be employed at the highest rate (74.2% down from 76.2% in 1994-95). Asian Americans were the least likely to work with only 56.4% employed. Whites also worked the most hours (23.1 hours per week) and Asian Americans the fewest (21.3 hours per week). (*Table C4*)
- *Campus*. Santa Barbara continued to have the highest employment rate (85.5%) while San Francisco reported the lowest (44.7%). San Francisco has had the lowest employment rate since SEARS 1979-80. There was little variation in hours worked; eight of the nine campuses reported median hours between 22 hours per week (Los Angeles) and 23.6 hours per week (Irvine). (*Table C11*)

Section D: Student Income

Undergraduates

The median annual income for undergraduates was \$3,499 (\$3,366 w/o UCB), a small increase from the inflation-adjusted 1994 income of \$3,299. (*Table D3*)

- *Dependency status*. The median income of independent students (\$7,807) was more than double than that of dependent undergraduates (\$2,996) (recall that independent students work nearly 6 hours per week more than their dependent counterparts). (*Table D1*)
- Aid recipient status. Non-aid recipients (\$3,749 or \$3,586 w/o UCB) had higher annual incomes than aid recipients (\$3,411or \$3,296 w/o UCB) did. (Table D3)
- *Ethnicity*. Chicano students had the highest employment rate in 1997-98 and also reported the highest median annual income (\$4,258), while Asian Americans (who were the least likely to be employed, and worked the fewest hours) reported the lowest median annual income (\$2,475). (*Table D4*)
- Campus. Undergraduates at San Francisco reported the highest median annual income (\$4,168) and Irvine reported the lowest median income (\$2,839). In past survey years Berkeley students reported the lowest median, but because of the apparent bias in the 1997-98 sample, the student income figure may not reflect the income of the population of undergraduates. (Table D6)

Graduates

Graduate student income was \$14,780 in 1997-98, a significant increase from the inflation-adjusted 1994-95 income of \$13,581. (*Table D3*)

- Aid recipient status. Non-aid recipients continue to have much higher incomes than aid recipients do (\$19,214 versus \$13,019). While the median income of non-aid recipients rose only slightly since 1994-95 (from \$19,096 to \$19,214 in constant dollars), the income of aid recipients rose significantly (from \$11,631 to \$13,019). (Table D3)
- *Ethnicity*. As in past surveys, white graduate students reported the highest median annual income of all the ethnic groups (\$16,534). This represents a large increase since the 1994-95 income of \$15,005 (in constant dollars). Asian American graduate students reported the lowest annual income (\$9,128). Chicano students experienced the largest income rise (from \$9,244 to \$11,575 in constant dollars). (*Table D5*)
- *Campus*. Berkeley graduate students reported the highest median annual income of the nine campuses (\$16,570). As would be expected because of their low number of hours worked per week, San Francisco reported the lowest median income (\$8,258). (*Table D6*)

Section E: Loans and Debt

Undergraduates

The proportion of undergraduates with loans rose slightly from 51% in 1994-95 to 52.9% in 1997-98. However, the average loan amount (among borrowers) fell somewhat from \$4,893 to \$4,660, in constant dollars (\$4,274 w/o UCB). (*Table E2*)

- *Employment status*. Students who were not employed continued to borrow at a lower rate than employed students (49.4% versus 55.7%) do (*Table E1*). However, the gap has narrowed in the last two survey years, from about 12 percentage points in 1994-95, to just over six in 1997-98. The average loan amount went down for both groups (from \$5,311 to \$4,788 for non-employed students and from \$4,621 to \$4,582 for employed students). (*Table E2*)
- *Parent income*. The most dramatic change in borrowing amounts occurred among non-employed students whose parents earned between \$60,000 and \$90,000 per year. Average loan amounts for this income group decreased by approximately \$3,000 since 1994-95 (w/o UCB). (*Table E2*)
- *Personal loans*. Approximately 40% of students took out personal loans from family and friends, a dramatic increase from past years where the rate has been 20%. The median loan amount also rose, from \$1,513 in 1994-95 to \$2,317, after adjusting for inflation. The percentage of students with credit card loans also rose sharply, from 19.3% to 34.5% in 1997-98. Median loan amounts for credit cards showed no change from past survey years (a median of \$1,479). (*Table E3*)
- Cumulative debt. Cumulative debt is the total amount a student has borrowed to finance his or her education. Overall, a higher percentage of students are borrowing and they are borrowing more money than in previous years. Almost three-quarters of all juniors borrowed money to finance their education in 1997-98. Cumulative debt rose about \$1,500 for all students (in constant dollars). (Table E4)
- *Home equity loans*. The percentage of families that took out home equity loans to help pay for UC increased from 8.3% in 1994-95 to 10.7% (w/o UCB). This increase occurred mostly among aid applicants while the percentage of home equity loans among non-aid applicants dropped slightly. (*Table E6*)

Graduates

- *Personal loans*. The percentage of graduate students taking out loans from family and friends or from credit cards rose more than five percentage points since 1994-95. The loan amount from family and friends fell from \$2,270 to \$1,878 (in constant dollars), while loan amounts from credit cards rose slightly. (*Table E3*)
- *Cumulative debt*. The cumulative indebtedness of new graduate students is the total amount borrowed prior to enrolling in the University of California plus the amount borrowed during their first year at UC. The percentage of students borrowing decreased, from 65.7% to 62.2%. Among students who did borrow there was an increase in the median constant dollar amount borrowed, from \$16,220 in 1994-95 to \$17,952 in 1997-98. (*Table E4*)

Section F: Budget Category

Students are classified into budget categories based on where they live during the academic year, their marital and parental status. Campus financial aid offices use the budget category distinctions to determine the expenses a student can be expected to encounter during the year. Students who commute to classes while living with their parents, for example, have different living (e.g. housing and food) expenses than student who live in dormitories or off-campus apartments and, therefore, must be distinguished for financial aid purposes. More detailed definitions of the different budget categories can be found in Appendix F.

Problems with the UCB undergraduate sample means that very few freshmen (and therefore students living on-campus) were included in the survey and a disproportionate number of non-traditional (over 24 years of age and typically living off-campus) students were included. Therefore, the budget category analysis focuses on systemwide totals that do not include Berkeley.

Undergraduates

The proportion of undergraduate commuters increased to 14.2% (w/o UCB), its highest level since the 1985-86 survey. The percentage of students in the other/off-campus category continued its decline since the 1991-92 peak of 61.2% to 52.9% (w/o UCB). (*Table F2*)

- Campus. (Table F3)
- <u>Commuter</u> Irvine reported the highest proportion of commuters (30.3%), as it has in the previous three surveys. Santa Barbara had the fewest commuters (3.5%).
- On-Campus Santa Cruz continues to have the largest proportion of undergraduates living on-campus (43.3%).
- Other/off-campus Excluding UCSF and UCB, Davis continues to have the largest off-campus population (65.2%). At 37.4%, Irvine had the smallest percentage of off-campus students.
- *Ethnicity.* (Table F4)
- Commuter Native Americans had the lowest percentage of commuters (6.7% w/o UCB), as they did in past years. Chicanos and students marking "other" had the highest proportions of commuters (17.6% and 19.9%, w/o UCB).
- On-Campus African Americans had the largest proportion of students living on-campus (38.6% w/o UCB), while Native Americans had the smallest (24.1% w/o UCB).
- Other/off-campus Native Americans and Latinos had the largest proportions of off-campus living (69.2% and 58.0%, w/o UCB). Asian Americans continued to report the smallest proportion living off-campus of all the ethnic groups.

Graduates

The vast majority of graduate students are in the category of other/off-campus (87.1%). In 1997-98, 29.9% of graduate students were married and 14.5% had children. (*Table F1*)

- Campus. (Table F6)
- Commuter Riverside reported the highest percentage of commuters (5.8%) while Santa Barbara reported the lowest (1.3%).
- On-Campus Systemwide, only 9.9% of graduate students live on-campus, but San Diego and Irvine those proportions are 37.2% and 29.7%, respectively. In comparison, only 2.7% of Berkeley graduate students live on-campus.
- Other/off-campus About 95% of students at Davis, Santa Barbara and Berkeley are in this budget category. Only 60.8% of San Diego graduate students live off-campus.

Section G: Expenses

A number of questions regarding student expenses were changed for the 1997-98 survey. Items that were traditionally captured in one question were disaggregated into separate questions. Where relevant, these changes are noted below. As a result of these modifications, expense figures are, in many cases, much higher than they were in past survey years. Appendix A contains a copy of the survey instrument.

Undergraduates

- Housing expenses continued to change very little systemwide across all budget categories. On-campus students pay \$685 per month for housing while students in the other/off-campus category pay \$462 per month. Married parents (\$899 per month) paid the highest housing costs. (*Table G5*)
- Food expenses rose for all budget categories. This could be due, in part, to the separation of food expenses into multiple questions on the 1997-98 survey. (*Table G6*)
- Books and school supplies expenses also rose for all budget categories (\$660 to \$787 for other/off-campus, \$667 to \$849 for commuters, \$667 to \$798 for on-campus, all in constant 1997 dollars). (*Table G7*)
- Computer related expenses cost undergraduates an average of \$407 during the academic year (a median expense of \$61). This question is new to the 1997-98 survey. (*Table G22*)
- Local transportation expenses increased since 1994-95 (\$64 to \$81 for commuters, \$25 to \$34 for other/off-campus, when adjusted for inflation). The range of response options was changed for the 1997-98 survey. (*Table G8*)

Graduates

- Housing expenses rose for on-campus graduate students (from \$604 to \$691 per month, in 1997 dollars) but they fell for students in the other/off-campus category (from \$728 to \$635, in 1997 dollars). Single off-campus housing costs (from uniform budget categories) rose from \$541 to \$577 per month. (*Table G5*)
- Food expenses rose by \$50-\$75 for all budget categories. Again, this increase may be due to changes in the food expense question in the 1997-98 questionnaire. (*Table G6*)
- Books and schools supplies expenses also rose for all budget categories (from \$559 to \$635 for off-campus, from \$625 to \$719 for commuters, in constant dollars). (Table G7)
- Computer expenses cost graduate students an average of \$604 for the academic year (a median cost of \$125). (*Table G22*)

APPENDIX E

Independent Student Definition

For the 1997-98 award year, a student is considered independent if he or she meets at least one of the following criteria:

- is at least 24 years of age by December 31, 1997. For the 1997-98 year this means that the student must have been born before January 1, 1974;
- is a veteran of the United States Armed Forces;
- is married (which may depend on the common law rules in the student's state of legal residence);
- is a ward of the court (or was a ward of the court until age 18) or both parents are deceased and the students has no adoptive or legal guardian (note that a student is not considered a ward of the court based solely on being incarcerated); or,
- have legal dependents other than a spouse.
