

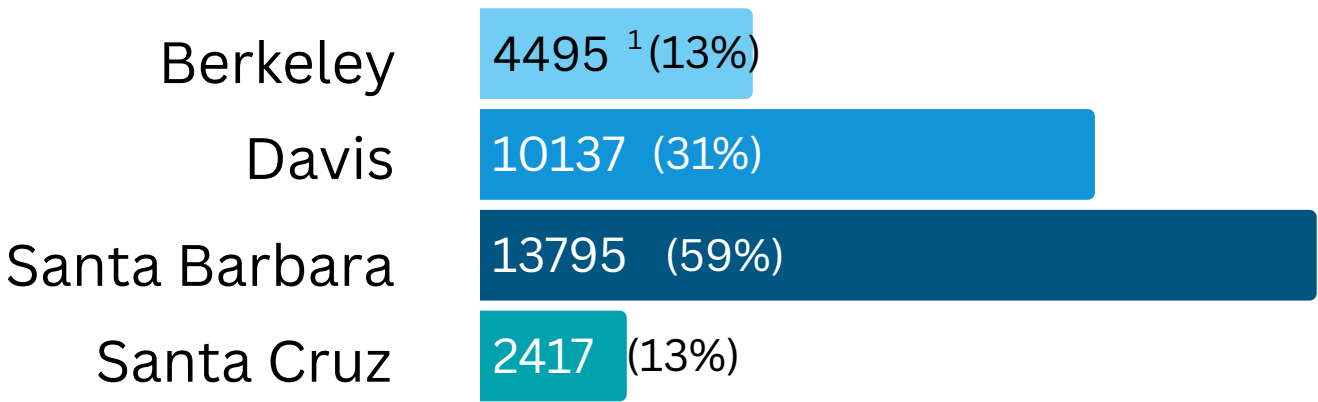

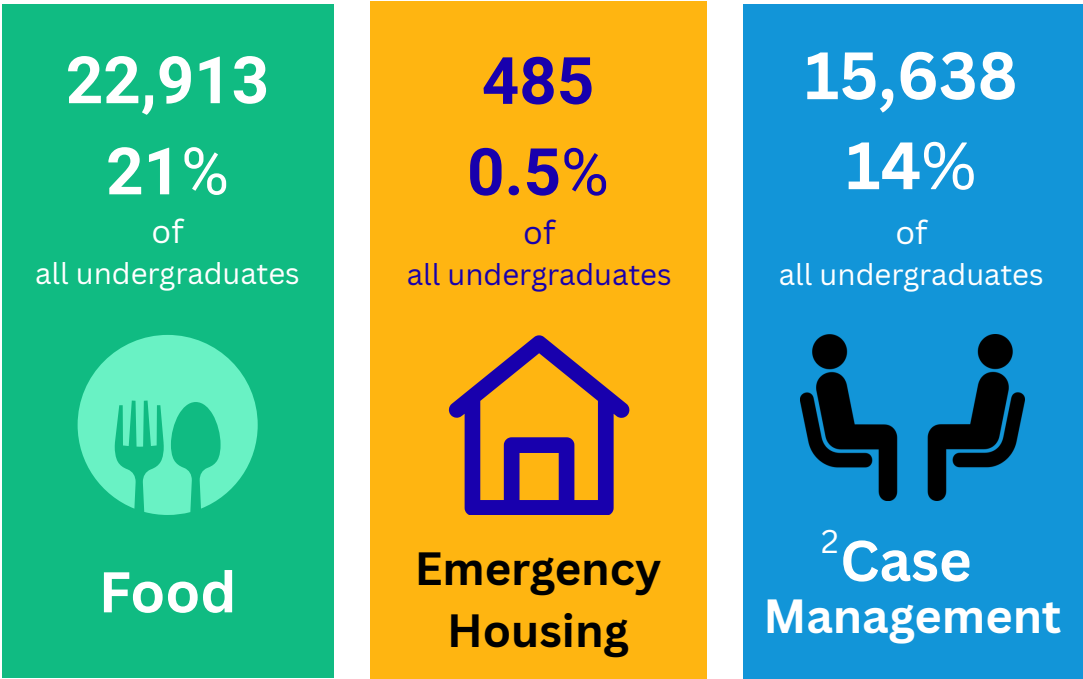

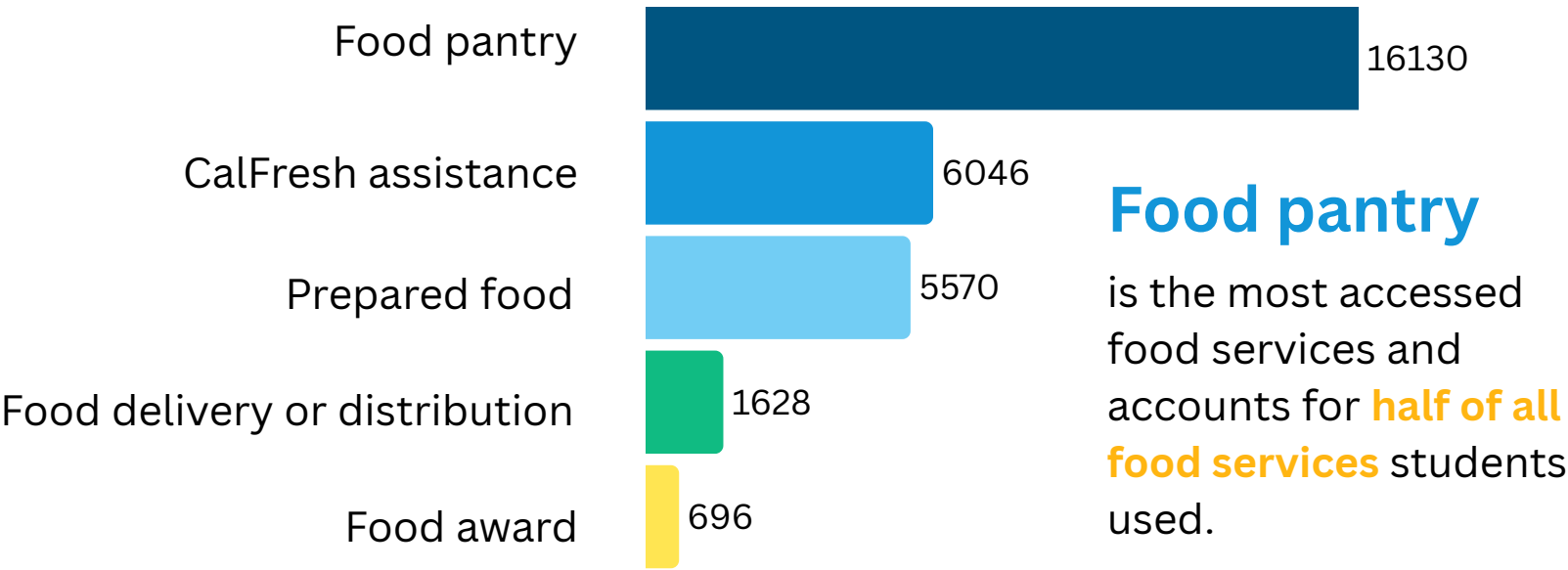

Utilization of different basic needs services



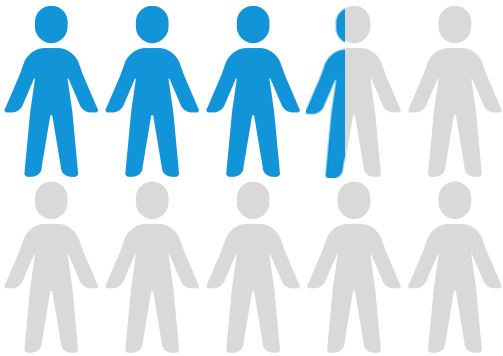

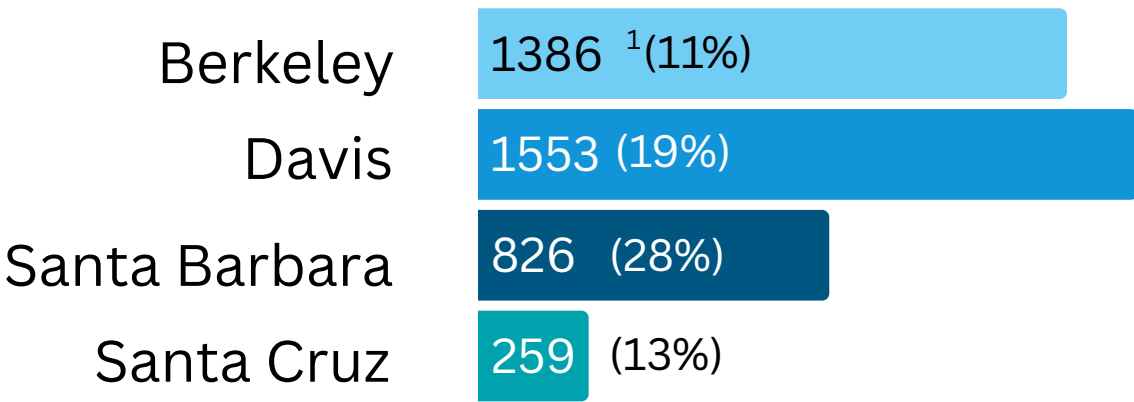

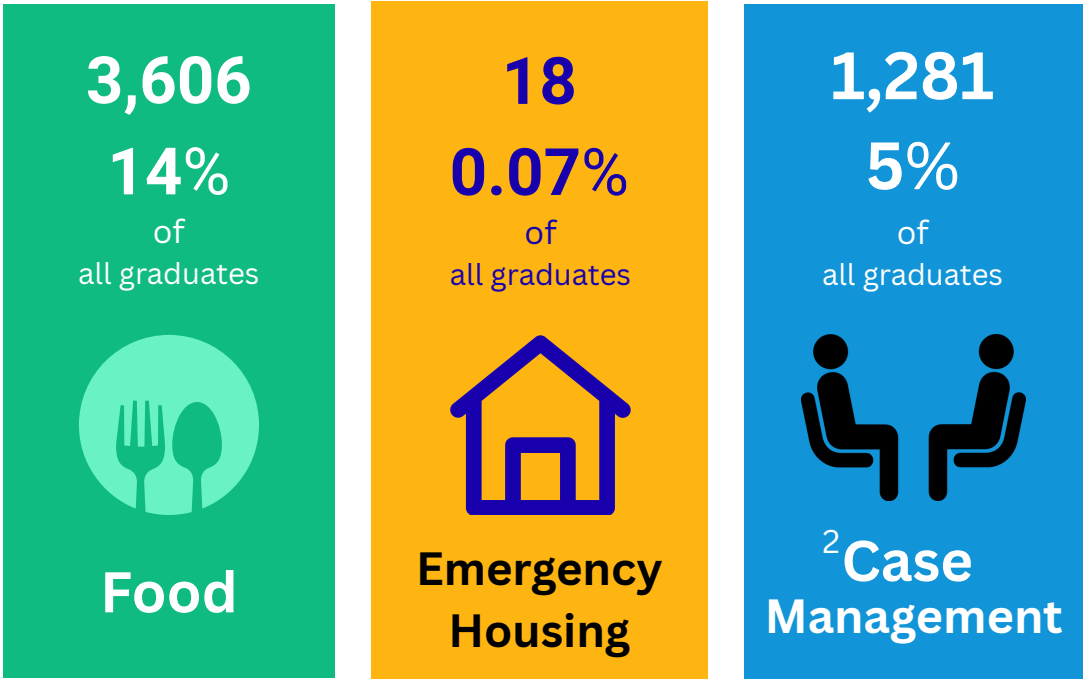

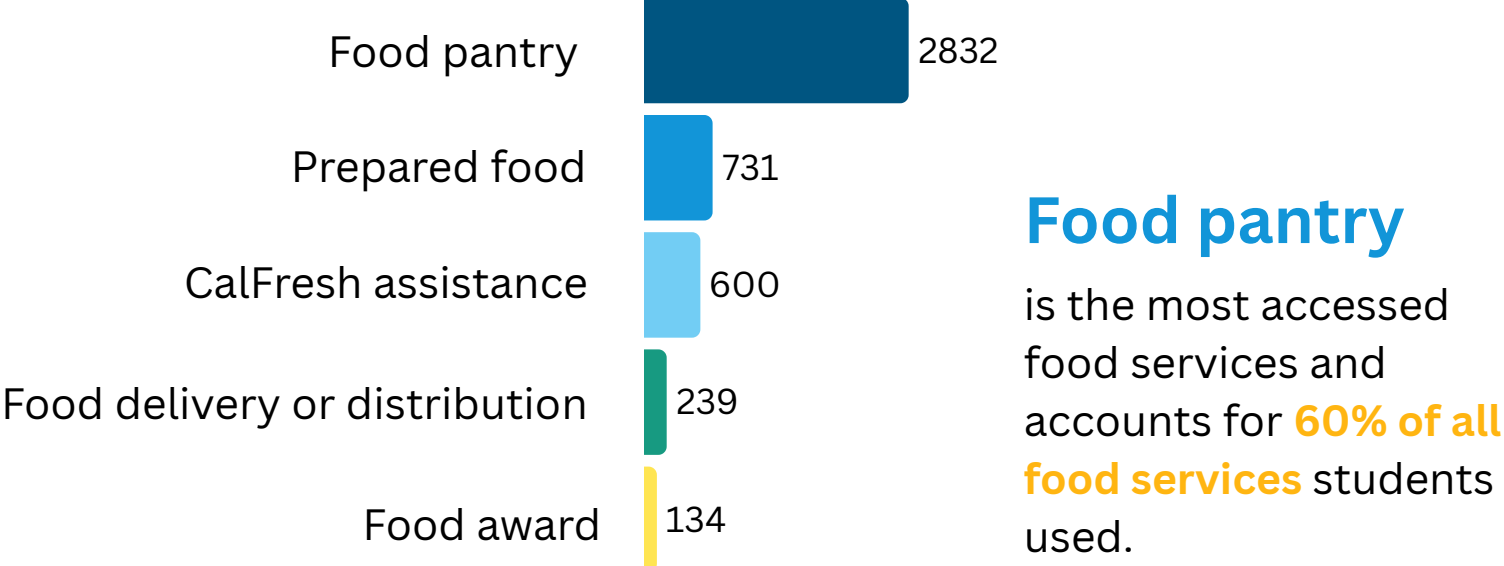

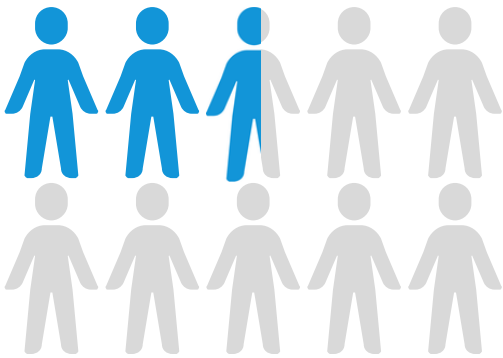

Service utilization among graduate students who are food insecure

of graduate students who are **food insecure** accessed basic needs food services



There was insufficient data to determine the proportion of housing-insecure graduate students who accessed emergency housing services. Food and housing insecurity data is derived from voluntary student experience surveys. The number of graduate students who both completed the survey and used housing services was substantially limited.



In this infographic, demographic distributions of service users are compared to the distributions of the overall undergraduate or graduate student population to indicate who are more likely to seek basic needs services on campus.

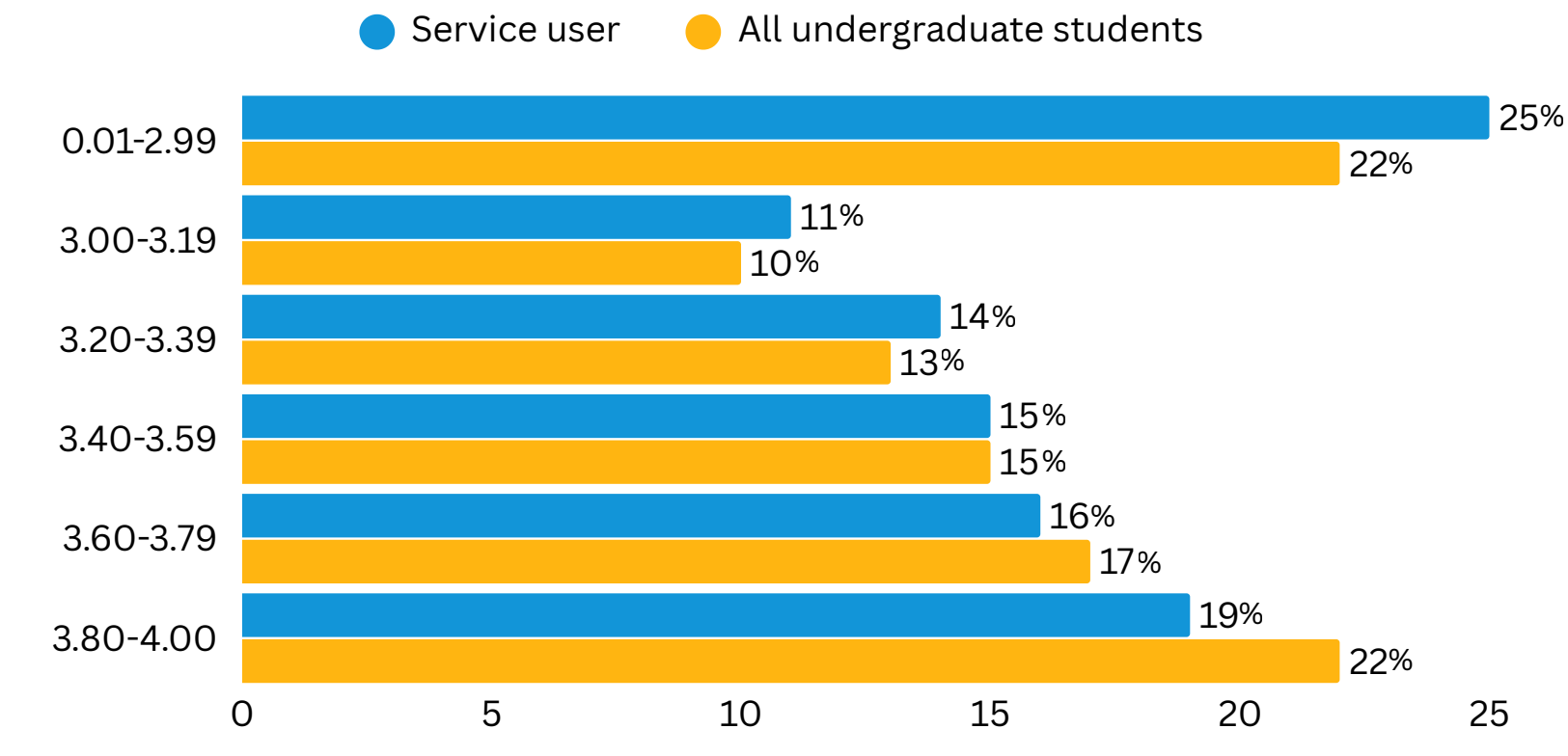

GPA

Undergraduate students with **LOWER GPA (< 3.40)** are more likely to use services than those with higher GPA.

Degree programs

Graduate students in **ACADEMIC DEGREE PROGRAMS** are more likely to use services compared to those in professional degree programs.
