Introduction

Climate Justice recognizes the disproportionate impacts of climate change on low-income communities and communities of color around the world, the people and places least responsible for the problem. It seeks solutions that address the root causes of climate change and in doing so, simultaneously address a broad range of social, racial, and environmental injustices

The Center for Climate Justice is a University of California system-wide initiative to address climate change as a social justice and equity issue. The Center's mission is to leverage and harness the power of the university to support, strengthen and build an emergent climate justice ecosystem and social movement that solves the climate crisis through science, systems thinking and social-ecological justice. They do this through innovative broader-impact research, transformative education, and public engagement. At the Center for Climate Justice, they envision a world where extractive systems and economies have been transformed into ones that are regenerative, equitable, and support the sustained wellbeing of all life.

My research project focuses on building a network map for the UC Center of Climate Justice website. The purpose of this network map is to build meaningful connections across different communities and organizations that are committed to climate justice. The goal is to provide, students, faculty and the community with resources to initiate important relationships needed for climate change resiliency.



Project Goals

This project aimed to create a Network map that would:

- Allow users to view different climate justice organizations across California
- Vision/Mission statements
- Contact information

Through this map, communities can network with other organizations who are committed to Climate Justice under the same guiding principles.


In addition, the UC Center for climate justice website would have access to the end results and data to:

Their strategies include:

- Educate and empower communities, especially focusing on rural areas, to advocate for themselves by providing them with technical assistance and resources
- Promote alternative methods for a safer environment
- Encourage youth to be aware of and participate in environmental issues
- Serve as a hub for environmental activism in the Central Valley

• Institutions have shown they cant/wont respond to the climate crisis on their own. Building connections outside the UC systems is crucial to increasing public awareness of climate change and inspires people to reach out to communities that they have never communicated with before.
